Did you know?

Burns in face or neck region, scorched nasal hairs, swollen lips, coughs, hoarseness, breathing difficulty or even unconsciousness, may all be signs of airway damage.

A patient with airway damage requires special attention.

REMEMBER

Keep flushing until victim reports no further pain.

This may take hours.

Burns involves a great risk on post injury infection.

Assignment 1

What kind of treatment has priority when dealing with burns?

Rinse burned area with clean, slightly cooled water. Keep rinsing until pain goes away.

Do your ABCDE; make sure the casualty does not go into dehydration shock.

Assignment 4

Name 2 complications to burns:

Fluid loss shock (dehydration) due to excessive evaporation from damaged skin. Post trauma infection of burned area.
